MARTIN LUTHER KING JR

On Martin Luther King Jr. Day, we reflect on Dr. King's philosophy of non-violence. In one of his most famous sermons, "Loving Your Enemies," Dr. King preached: "Returning hate for hate multiplies hate, adding deeper darkness to a night already devoid of stars. Darkness cannot drive out darkness; only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that."

In honor of "Martin Luther King Jr. Day", I would like to share MLK's now famous "six principles of nonviolence," based on his first book, "The Stride Toward Freedom."

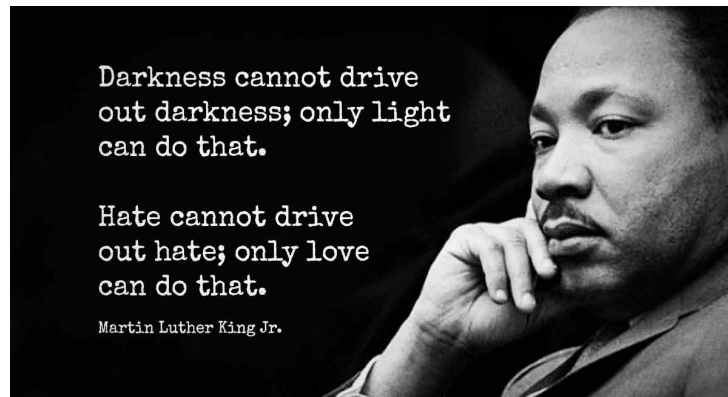
1. Nonviolence is a way of life for courageous people. It is a active nonviolent resistance to evil.
2. Nonviolence seeks to win friendship and understanding. The end result of nonviolence is redemption and reconciliation.
3. Nonviolence seeks to defeat injustice, not people. Nonviolence recognizes that evildoers are also victims.
4. Nonviolence holds that suffering can educate and transform. Nonviolence willingly accepts the consequences to its acts.
5. Nonviolence chooses love instead of hate. Nonviolence resists violence to the spirit as well as the body. Nonviolence love is active, not passive. Nonviolence love does not sink to the level of the hater. Love restores community and resists injustice. Nonviolence recognizes the fact that all life is interrelated.
6. Nonviolence believes that God is on the side of justice. The nonviolent resister has deep faith that justice will eventually win.

As we remember Dr Martin Luther King Jr. and what could have been if he had not been committed to non-violence, we continue to consider our own attitude towards violence in the face of what often is a violent world.

In a time when there is so much turmoil and adversity as is today, this is a call to change our hearts and minds. Jesus told us to love one another and this quote is a reminder of God's heart's call for our lives. Dispel the darkness with the light of God's word. Dispel hatred by loving with God's unconditional love.
